When the dragon lover saw the real dragon, he was terrified. He ran and hid himself trembling with fear. The real dragon was disappointed that this so-called dragon lover only loved the images of dragons and not the real ones.

If God's kingdom comes today, how would we react? Are we really ready to do justice, love mercy, and walk humbly with God? If Jesus rang your doorbell tomorrow, would you be happy to let him in and show him how you are living?
