Following the dinner an old fashioned sing-a-long was conducted by Roy Bourgault, and the program was opened with the singing of Happy Birthday to the Boy Scouts in honor of the Diamond Anniversary. Bourgault was assisted in the opening by four Cub Scouts from Pack 5, which is sponsored by the Trinity Lutheran Church of Worcester, who wheeled in a birthday cake for the celebration.

The formal program was opened by Gregory R. Szlyk, a thirteen year old Star Scout from Troop 141, which is sponsored by the Rutland Grange #242. Greg spoke briefly on "75 Years of Heritage and Me".

AMERICAN LEGION SCOUT OF THE YEAR NO-TRATION PAPERS AVAILABLE

Nomination papers for the American Legion Scout of the year are available at the Council Service Center.

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

The nominee must:

 Be a registered, active member of a Boy Scout Troop or Varsity Scout Team sponsored by an American Legion Post or Auxiliary Unit OR be a registered active member of a duly charted Boy Scout Troop or Varsity Scout Team and the son o an American Legion Family. Have received the Eagle Scout Award.
 Be an active member of his religious institution have rendered outstanding service to his religious institution, school and community. Have received appropriate denominational
 Religious emblem. Have demonstrated practical citizenship in church, school, Scouting and community (i.e. Student Council President or Representa-
tive, local Teen Club chairman, leader in Com- munity-wide service projects, Participation in sports, Senior Patrol Leader, Junior Assistant Scoutmaster, etc.).
 Have reached his 15th. birthday, but not his 18th. by June 30. Submit at least four letters of recommendation and testimony with Nomination Application, one
letter required from each of these group lead- ers: religious institution, school, community and Scouting.

SERVICE IS OUR BUSINESS

WHAT DOES THE MOHEGAN COUNCIL DO FOR SCOUT LEADERS AND SCOUTING UNITS ?

TO HELP THE LEADER WITH ADMINISTRATION OF THE UNIT, THE COUNCIL MAINTAINS A SCOUT SERVICE CENTER WITH CLERICAL STAFF TO:

Handle registrations, Boys' Life subscriptions, and special requests to the national council office and other organizations.

2. Maintains a supply of literature, insignia, forms, certificates, etc., needed by the leader to carry on the unit's program.

Keep records of advancement, membership, training,

etc., necessary to unit operation.

4. Produce monthly and special council bulletins to to keep leaders informed of latest local and national Scouting news, coming events, etc.

5. Produce notices, minutes, agendas, etc., for district and council committees that are developing programs for leader and unit benefit.

6. Handle phone calls and visitors for information related to unit operation and Scouting procedures.

Provide dozens of regular and special forms, applications, scoreboards, certificates, and literature, helpful in unit program. 8. Produce district and council calendars and

schedules, programs, kits and special aids to

assist leaders and their committees.

Make reservations for films, equipment, long-term camping, short term camps, camporees, jamborees, high-adventure bases, training courses, meetings, Cub Scout leader pow wows, Exploring activities, annual council and district meetings, troop leader and den chief events.

TO ASSIST LEADERS, THE COUNCIL EMPLOYS A TRAINED, FULL TIME PROFESSIONAL STAFF WHO COUNSEL, GUIDE, AND INSPIRE:

Through informal training in unit operation.

Through person-to-person counseling on unit relationships, administrative, and operational problems.

- 3. Through guidance of all committees, commissioners, roundtables, meetings, conferences, courses, district and council activities in the development of programs that directly benefit leaders and units.
- 4. Through contacts with the community resources (clubs, churches, government, etc.) secure help for all units that they alone could not obtain. The use of parks, recreational areas, use of buildings for special affairs, picnic areas, campsites, and swimming facilities are a few examples.

PROVIDING THE UNIT WITH DISTRICT AND COUNCIL ACTIVITIES AND SERVICE, THE COUNCIL:

- Plans and conducts various types of activities in which units participate such as Scouting Anniversary Week and Scout Show. 2. Organizes camporees, Cub Scout day camps, jambor-
- ees, high-adventure trips, Explorer events, etc.
- Works with various community groups to arrange for Scout participation in civic affairs and Good Turn projects.
- Recruits and trains a corps of commissioners for assisting with unit program and maintaining standards.

IN EDUCATIONAL AND RELATIONSHIPS PROGRAM, THE COUNCIL PROVIDES THE LEADERSHIP WITH:

- 1. A library of films, filmstrips, records, projectors, and screens for use in training and promotional programs, at no cost to the unit.
- 2. Informal and formal training courses with most of the cost of literature and materials, etc., and all the staff time included in the council budget.
- 3. Monthly roundtables for the benefit of leaders, committeemen, assistants, and den leaders providing materials, staff, and other costs.
- 4. Scouter's Key, training awards. Den Leader's Training Award, Silver Beaver, other Scouter recognitions and Eagle badges.

5. A merit badge counselor corps in more than 100 subjects.

6. A variety of advancement forms and certificates without charge. These are processed in the thousands each year.

IN THE FIELD OF CAMPING AND OUTDOOR ACTIVITIES, THE COUNCIL:

- 1. Maintains Treasure Valley Scout Reservation for year-round camping and Cub Scout family out-door events. Our Scout camp serves as a year-round activity, camping and training center.
- 2. Offers units the use of equipment and facilities for short-term, weekend, year-round, and long term summer camping.
- 3. Budget covers costs of most camp repairs, replacement, utilities, maintenance, insurance, camp ranger. These and other charges are not paid for by boys' fees.
- 4. Employs a full-time camp ranger for the protection of the Scout camping properties and the convenience of units using facilities. He keeps these facilities available at all times.
- Provides campers' savings cards, unit leaders' guidebook, camp slides, folders, literature, and other aids to help units with their outdoor pro-
- 6. Provides scholarships or "camperships" for scouts who need some help to have a summertime camp experience.
- Offers units the high adventure of Philmont Scout Ranch, high adventure bases, national jamborees, field days, camporees, and other special events. These would not exist without a council giving leadership and coordination.

TO HELP THE LEADER DEVELOP UNIT'S PROGRAM, THE COUNCIL PROVIDES:

- Program helps, program planning charts and calendar of activities, meetings, and special events.
- Awards such as ribbons, certificates, round-up awards, etc.
- 3. Round-up, camporee, and Scouting Anniversary Week kits, posters, and other materials.
- 4. Sample song sheets, ceremonies, parents' night program outlines, training aids, etc.

Materials, books, pamphlets, folders, filmstrips, and special helps from the National Council and cooperating organizations.

SIX METHODS OF GIVING TO SCOUTING

You may make gifts to Scouting in the Mohegan Council in the following six ways:

1. A direct cash gift.

Outright gift of securities. Stocks or bonds may be made payable to the Mohegan Council.

Planned gift. A charitible bequest or trust established through your will becomes a living memorial. Your attorney knows the many advantages for you through this type of gift.

- 4. Gifts in trust. A trust Under Will provides a gift that doesn't take effect until death, minimizing the impact of federal estate tax, Through the Unitrust and Annuity Trusts, you can give a certain amount, obtain a charitable deduction during your lifetime, and retain income for your personal use now and/or beneficiaries later. The Mohegan Council receives your gift at a future time, and you qualify for a tax deduction.
- Life insurance. Contributions through a new or exixting policy can designate the Mohegan Council as beneficiary.
- Property. Your attorney or tax advisor can inform you of tax advantages for the charitable assignment or transfer of property and property rights, including works of art.

DID YOU KNOW ?

The largest single cost of Scouting is stamped "Paid in Full" by the more than 1800 adult volunteer leaders who give an estimated 90,000 hours of their time annually in service to the youth of the Mohegan Council. If these volunteer leaders were paid \$3.35 per hoour, their services would cost the Council \$1.3 million per year.

PLAQUES FOR UNITS

Any Cub Scout Pack, Boy Scout Troop, or Explorer Post whose total dollars raised in their unit campaign reaches the level of Patron (\$500) or above will be awarded the appropriate plaque upon application. Plaques will be awarded to the unit upon application to the Council Service Center.

PLAGUES FOR INDIVIDUALS

The Sustaining Membership Appreciation plaques shown may be earned by any individual who becomes a Sustaining Member at the level of giving listed below each plaque. The Council Service Center will mail the appropriate plaque to the individual upon receipt of the membership and if indicated on the S.M.E., card. A year tab will be mailed to those who have earned a plaque in the past and are renewing their membership at the same level of giving if indicated on the S.M.E. card.

HOW CAN I PAY FOR MY S.M.E. CONTRIBUTION ?

Of course, your check or cash is the preferred method of payment for your contribution. If you prefer, you may pledge an amount for your membership and have the Mohegan Council send you a courtesy billing in the month of your choice between January and June of the current year. To use the billing menthod your pledge must be at least \$10.00.
